# THE 2,000 GUINEAS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

## 80 Star Drivers in Tonight's Four Terrific Heats

TONIGHT we start the biggest event ever in the history of Stock Car Racing with the first heats of the 2,000 guineas World Championship. Hundreds of entries were received for this terrific attraction and it took hours of consideration of each individual before the eighty acceptances were finally decided.

Seven countries are represented and no fewer than eleven tracks from as far as Edinburgh in the North to Plymouth in the West have competitors lining up for the sport's most coveted title.

#### THE MONEY

For those who are paying their first visit to Harringay this season here, briefly, is the way the 2,000

guineas is being distributed.

Each starter in tonight's four heats will receive £10 starting money and in addition there will be a further £50 prize money for each race. First ten home in each heat will go forward to the two semi-finals next week and the non-qualifiers will go into the Consolation Race—the last race of tonight's meeting—in which there is £100 to be won.

The forty left in will receive £5 starting money for next week's semi-finals in each of which there will be

additional prize money of £100.

Again, the first ten in each semi-final will qualify for the World Championship Final here on June 24th. No starting money will be paid for this race but, instead, the winner will receive £350 and a handsome trophy, second will get £150 and there will be a further £100 split up among the drivers filling the minor places.

#### NO ENTRY FEE

The whole of the 2,000 guineas has been put up by the Stock Car Racing Company and the drivers have not been asked to pay anything at all by way of entry fee. In other words, they have everything to win—nothing to lose.

So that every driver should have an equal chance, the draw for heats and starting positions was made on the track in front of the public during the interval of last week's meeting by Norman Veronique who is, himself, taking part.

It may appear that the drivers drawn in the front rank of starters have a decided advantage. But there are some who feel that the middle or even the rear of the field is better.

#### GOOD LUCK TO ALL

Many of the drivers have travelled long distances to race tonight. We hope that luck will be with them to make their journeys worthwhile. They all have a hard task ahead. Each has the same idea—to sweep aside all opposition that is standing in the way of picking up this great prize.

We, ourselves, have no favourites. We know that whoever ultimately wins the world title will have had to fight hard and will deserve this great

honour.

We hope that the racing will provide the biggest thrills ever in this exciting sport and wish every one of the competitors an even break with Dame Fortune.

Jack Tipping, who competes in heat 4 tonight, won the televised race at Coventry on Monday. Also in the Coventry race and in the same heat this evening was ex-fighter pilot Jerzy Wojtowicz, who holds the Polish V.C.

Gallant little ex-speedway rider Joe Bowkis is in heat 2 and brother Berny, fifth in his two races here last week, is in the next race. Third pair of brothers are the Teece's from Hampstead. Charlie goes out in heat 2 and George in heat 3.



Now Bill hasn't driven here before but many of our drivers have clashed with him and it would appear that he will go far in the competition and at the same time have no respect for anyone who gets in his path.

Those are some of the drivers in this World Championship. Among them may be the eventual winner. Chances are, however, that the winner will be somebody we least expect. We don't know—and what is more we don't really care so long as you, the public get thrilling racing.

# Journalist-Driver's Sensational Performance

THE "Daily Mirror's" Eric Wainwright provided one of the biggest thrills ever seen on a Stock Car track last Friday and only thirty people were in the Stadium to watch him!

Eric wanted to know what it felt like to drive a Stock Car and, to enable him to write his story, we arranged for him to drive a car round the Harringay track last Friday afternoon. One of our drivers, who requests that he remains anonymous, sportingly loaned his car and it was not until Eric had completed his first lap that he informed us that he had never before driven a car of any description!

Off went Eric, an ex-R.A.F. pilot, on another attempt to set up a personal best time for the lap. Coming out of the Arena turn he got into a terrific slide, snaked his way up the straight and then charged head-first into one of the oil drums. Speed at the time, estimated by some of our drivers who were watching, was in

the region of 35 m.p.h.

Over the first drum he went, charged into the second at such a speed that the car leapt a clear six feet into the

air and dropped clean on top of a third. As the front wheels hit the track it appeared certain that he would go completely over but miraculously the back wheels came down and the engine stalled.

Willing hands dashed to his aid only to find Eric sitting there with a broad grin over his face. And his comment? "That was darn good fun."

Not so funny for the owner, however, who found that the engine mountings had collapsed and that he was faced with an overall repair bill of something like £20. Nevertheless, he took it in a wonderful spirit and was happier still when told that the bill would be met.

And a big hand to Eric who proved what so many of us already knew—that a journalist will go to any lengths to write his story with authority.


